Town of Erie Home Rule Voter Opinion Survey Topline Results

Magellan Strategies are pleased to present the topline results of a live telephone and online survey of 1,531 registered voters from the Town of Erie, Colorado. The interviews were conducted from January 10th - 19th, 2022. This survey has a margin of error of +/- 2.41% at the 95 percent confidence interval. The survey data was weighted to be representative of the voter turnout demographics within Erie, Colorado for a midterm election cycle.
