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# Executive Summary

## Summary of Survey Methods

The Town of Erie – Community Center Expansion Survey offered residents the opportunity to provide input on the future of the Town’s Community Center. The purpose of this research was to understand community needs, priorities, and aspirations in order to inform long-term planning and visioning efforts.

Surveys were mailed to all 4,500 residents in March 2026. A total of 846 surveys were completed, yielding a response rate of 19%. In addition to the scientific survey of randomly selected households, a community-wide, open-participation survey was also conducted. The key findings and body of this report focus on the responses to the scientific survey; the results to the open-participation survey have been provided separately in *Appendix G: Open Participation Survey Results*.

Survey results were weighted so that respondent demographics were represented in proportions reflective of the entire adult population of the Town. The margin of error is plus or minus three percentage points around any given percentage point reported for all survey respondents.

## Key Findings

*Residents are broadly satisfied with the Town’s parks and recreation system.*

- Survey respondents were asked to rate the quality of five facilities and services provided by the Park and Recreation Department of Erie. Ratings were consistently strong across all service areas. Parks received the highest positive evaluation at 85%, followed by trails (78%), the Erie Community Center (77%), and recreation programs (75%). The availability of information about parks and recreation offerings was also viewed favorably, with 75% of the residents rating it positively. These results indicate broad satisfaction with the Town’s parks and recreation system and reflect particularly high approval of park facilities.

*Most residents support renovating and expanding the Erie Community Center.*

- Respondents were then asked whether they supported or opposed renovating and expanding the Erie Community Center to address current space and program constraints. About three-fourths of respondents indicated they strongly or somewhat supported the expansion, while 1 in 10 neither supported nor opposed it. Only a small minority reported opposing the project.
- Among respondents who support the Erie Community Center expansion, the most frequently cited reasons relate to population growth and the need for enhanced services. Just over one-quarter indicated that Erie’s growing population creates a need for expanded facilities, while another fourth referenced the desire for new or improved services as their primary motivation.
- Among respondents who oppose the Erie Community Center expansion, concerns about financial impacts were the most frequently cited reasons. A fourth of the respondents opposing the project identified the overall cost as their primary concern, while 22% expressed worry that the expansion would lead to higher taxes.

- Respondents were also asked how important it was that the Erie Community Center Expansion focus on each of six different areas. About two-thirds of respondents rated expanded fitness space as essential or very important. Roughly half considered increased indoor playground and youth space, additional gymnasium space, and the modernization of mechanical, electrical, and AV systems to be essential or very important. About a third of respondents said that improving staff and administrative space was at least very important. Finally, about 1 in 5 respondents rated the addition of new multipurpose meeting rooms as important.

*Most residents would prefer a sales tax increase over a property tax increase to fund the Erie Community Center expansion.*

- About 7 in 10 respondents said they would very or somewhat likely vote in favor of a sale tax increase of 0.50% to fund the Erie Community Center expansion, while about 5 in 10 respondents said they would very or somewhat likely vote in favor of a property tax increase of 1.653 mills to fund the Erie Community Center expansion.
- Support for the two funding mechanisms also differed in the composition of their supporter bases. For the sales tax increase, a majority of supporters fell into the “very likely” category (43%), with an additional 26% saying they were “somewhat likely” to vote yes. In contrast, support for the property tax increase was more evenly split between levels of likelihood: 24% said they were “very likely” to support it, while 22% said they were “somewhat likely.” These patterns indicate that the sales tax option not only has a larger overall base of support but also a higher proportion of respondents who express strong likelihood of voting in favor.
- In a subsequent question, respondents were asked which funding option they would prefer if the Town decided to move forward with the Erie Community Center expansion. About half of respondents opted for the sales tax increases, while close to 2 in 10 opted for the property tax increase. Also 2 in 10, said this is not the time to expand the Erie Community Center, while 1 in 10 was undecided on how to proceed.
- Among respondents who preferred a sales tax increase, the most common reason was concern about existing property tax levels. About 4 in 10 respondents indicated that property taxes are already high, making a sales tax the more acceptable option. Another 24% preferred a sales tax because it distributes costs across a wider share of residents, visitors, and consumers.
- Among respondents who preferred a property tax increase, the most common reason was concern about the fairness of a sales tax. About a third of the respondents preferring the property tax described sales taxes as regressive or unfair, making a property-based approach more acceptable to them. Another 15% felt that residents—rather than visitors or non-residents—should be responsible for funding the project.

## Survey Background

The Town of Erie contracted with Polco to conduct a community-wide survey. The primary goal of the survey was to assess the attitudes and opinions of residents regarding the future of the Erie Community Center.

Aimed at gauging community needs, priorities, and aspirations to inform long-term planning and visioning efforts, this type of survey helps council members, staff, and the public set priorities for budget decisions. It also lays the groundwork for tracking community opinions on key issues, helping to ensure the highest possible service quality over time.

## Survey Administration

A total of 4,500 Erie's households were randomly selected to participate in the 2026 Erie Community Center Expansion Survey. The 4,500 households selected to participate in the survey were contacted two times. First, an invitation postcard informing the household members that they had been selected to participate in the Town of Erie Community Center Expansion Survey was sent on March 3, 2026. The postcard included a URL and a QR code to take the survey online. Approximately one week after mailing the postcard, these households were mailed a paper survey containing a cover letter enlisting participation. The cover letter also included a URL and QR code where respondents could go to complete the survey online, if desired. The packet also contained a postage-paid return envelope in which the survey recipients could return the completed questionnaire to Polco. Completed surveys were collected over four weeks, with the survey closing on March 31, 2026. There were 846 respondents to the mailed questionnaire (with 102 undeliverable addresses), yielding a response rate of 19%. The margin of error is plus or minus three percentage points around any given percentage for all respondents.

Survey results were weighted so that respondent gender, age, housing unit type (attached or detached), housing tenure (rent or own), race, ethnicity and district were represented in the proportions reflective of the entire Town. More information about the survey methodology can be found in *Appendix F: Survey Methodology*.

## How the Results Are Reported

For the most part, the full set of frequencies, or the "percent positive," are presented in the body and narrative of the report. The percent positive is the combination of the top two most positive response options (i.e., "excellent" and "good;" "very safe" and "somewhat safe;" "strongly support" and "somewhat support").

On many of the questions in the survey, respondents could give an answer of "don't know." The proportion of respondents giving this reply is shown in the full set of responses included in *Appendix B: Complete Survey Frequencies* and is discussed in the body of this report if it is 30% or greater. However, these responses have been removed from the analyses presented in the body of the report, unless otherwise indicated. In other words, the majority of the tables and graphs in the body of the report display the responses from respondents who had an opinion about a specific item.

For some questions, respondents were permitted to select multiple responses. When the total exceeds 100% in a table for a multiple response question, it is because some respondents are counted in multiple categories. When a table for a question that only permitted a single response does not total to exactly 100%, it is due to the customary practice rounding values to the nearest whole number.

## **Precision of Estimates**

It is customary to describe the precision of estimates made from surveys by a “level of confidence” and accompanying “confidence interval” (or margin of error). The margin of error for this survey is generally no greater than plus or minus three percentage points around any given percent reported for the entire sample (N=846).

## **Comparison of Results By Subgroups**

Selected survey results were compared by respondent length of residency, housing unit type (attached or detached), housing unit tenure (rent or own), age, gender, income and district of residence. These crosstabulations are summarized and presented in tabular form in *Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics*.

# Survey Results

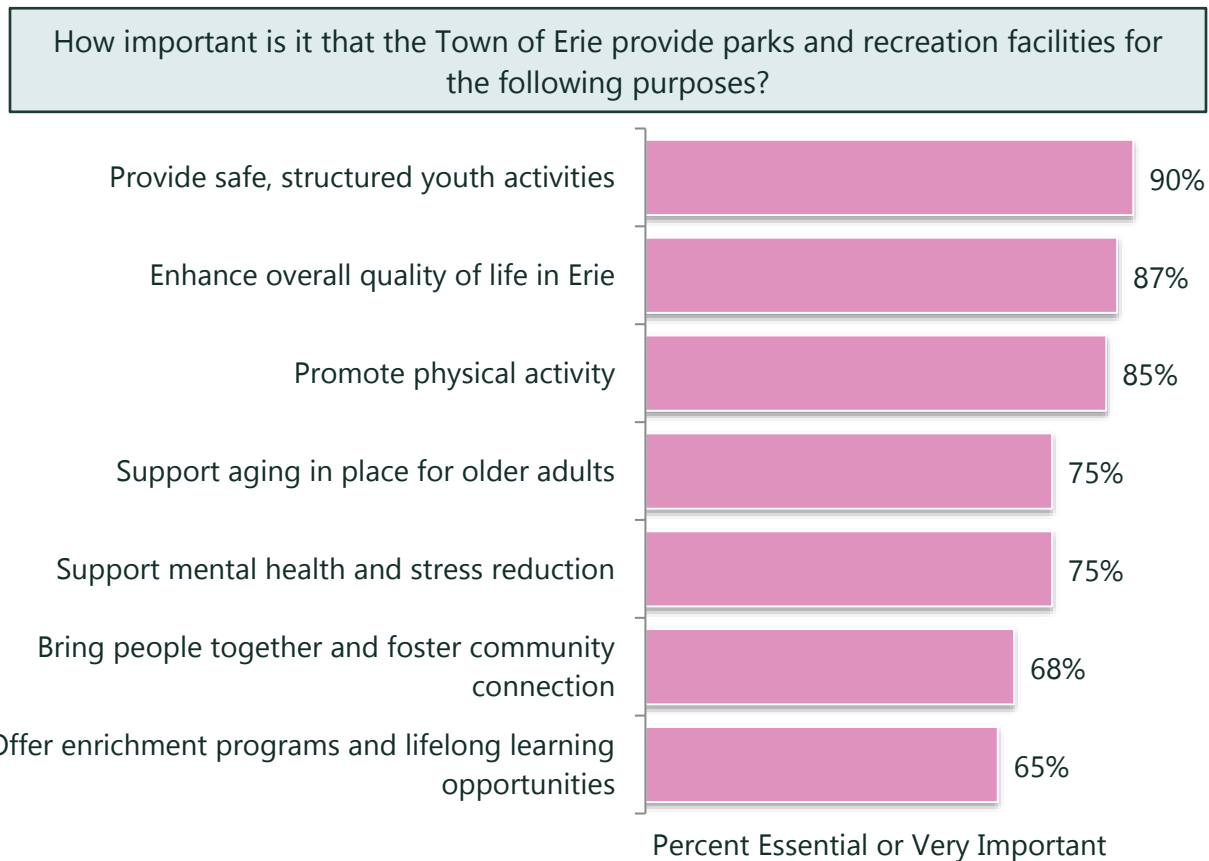
## Parks and Recreation Importance, Quality, and Use

Survey respondents placed high importance on a range of parks and recreation goals. Providing safe, structured youth activities emerged as the top priority, with 9 in 10 respondents rating it as essential or very important—nearly equal to the importance placed on enhancing overall quality of life and promoting physical activity.

Other goals also received strong support. Approximately three-quarters of respondents identified supporting aging in place for older adults as essential or very important, and a similar share emphasized the importance of promoting mental health and reducing stress. Additionally, two-thirds of respondents highlighted the value of bringing people together and offering enrichment programs and lifelong learning opportunities.

Renters and residents who have lived in Erie for five years or less were more likely to rate fostering community connection as essential or very important compared with homeowners and longer-term residents (for additional comparisons by respondent demographics, see *Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics*).

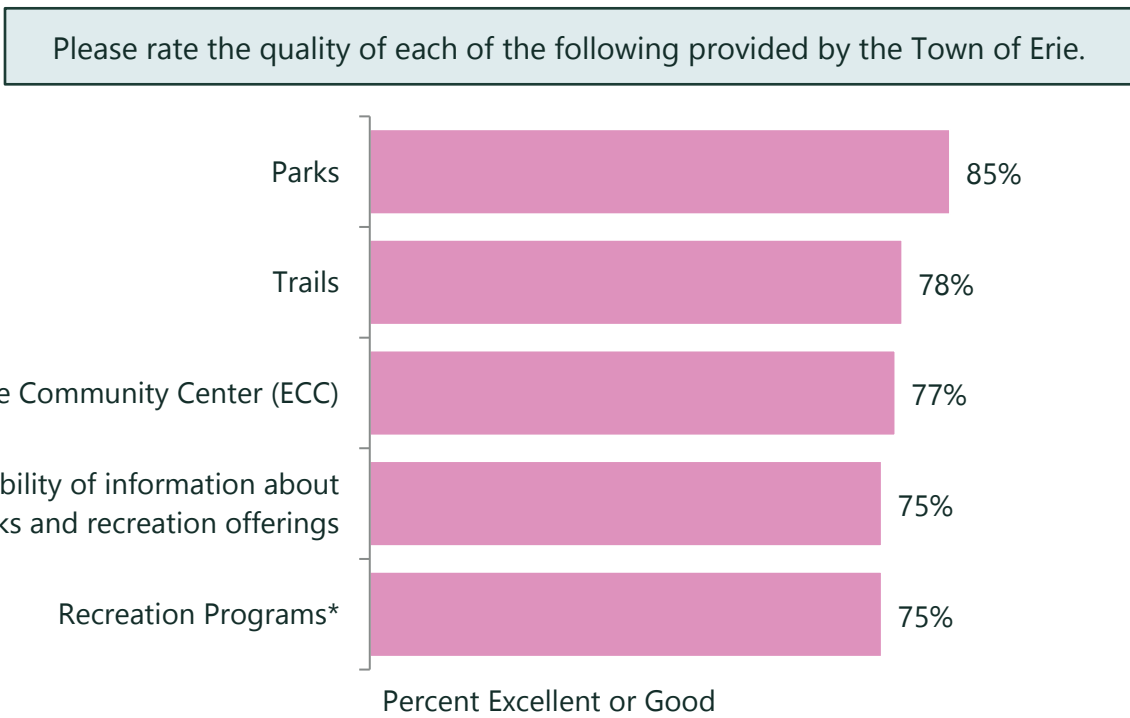
**Figure 1: Importance Assigned to Parks and Recreation Goals, 2026**



Survey respondents were asked to rate the quality of five facilities and services provided by the Park and Recreation Department of Erie. Ratings were consistently strong across all service areas. Parks received the highest positive evaluation at 85%, followed by trails (78%), the Erie Community Center (77%), and recreation programs (75%). The availability of information about parks and recreation offerings was also viewed favorably, with 75% of the residents rating it positively. These results indicate broad satisfaction with the Town’s parks and recreation system and reflect particularly high approval of park facilities.

Residents aged 55 and older as well as those living in households making less than \$200,000 per year were more likely than younger residents and those in higher-income households to give positive ratings to the Erie Community Center (for additional comparisons by respondent demographics, see *Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics*).

**Figure 2: Quality of Parks and Recreation Services, 2026**



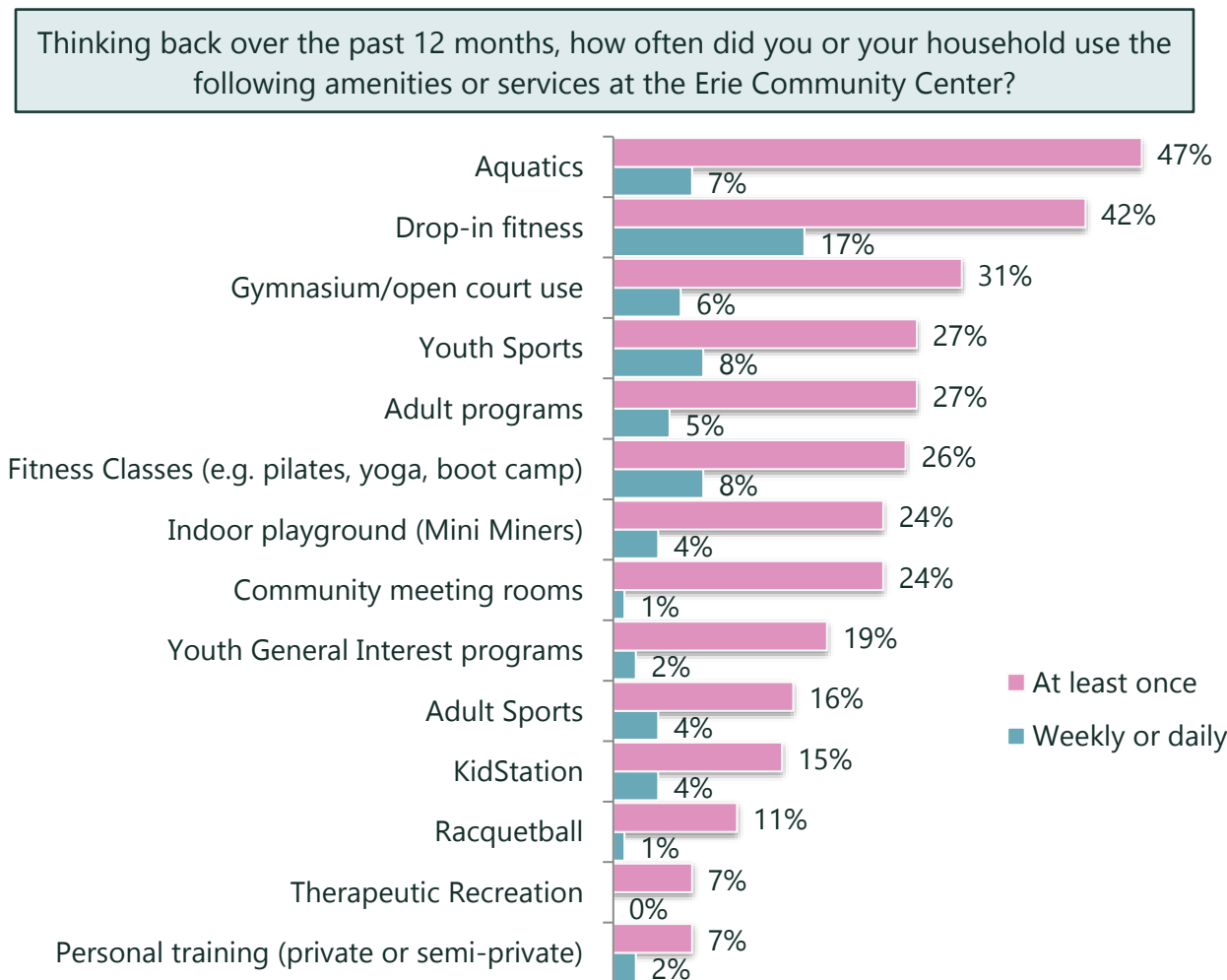

Residents were also asked how frequently they used various Erie Community Center services and amenities over the past 12 months. Aquatics had the highest overall level of engagement, with nearly half of respondents reporting using it at least once in the last year. Drop-in fitness was the next most commonly used amenity (about 4 in 10), followed by gymnasium/open court use (used by roughly 3 in 10 respondents). Youth sports, adult programs, fitness classes, the indoor playground (Mini Miners), and community meeting rooms showed moderate participation, with about one-quarter of residents reporting use.

Lower overall usage levels were reported for youth general interest programs (19%), adult sports (16%), KidStation (15%), racquetball (11%), and both therapeutic recreation and personal training (7% each). These results indicate that aquatics and fitness-related amenities are the most frequently utilized components of the Erie Community Center.

When analyzing the intensive use, those services or facilities used on daily or weekly basis, the drop-in fitness topped the list (17% of respondents reported using it daily or weekly), followed by fitness classes (8%), youth sports (8%), aquatics (7%) and gymnasium/open court use (6%). **Figure 3: Erie Community Center Use in the Past 12 Months**

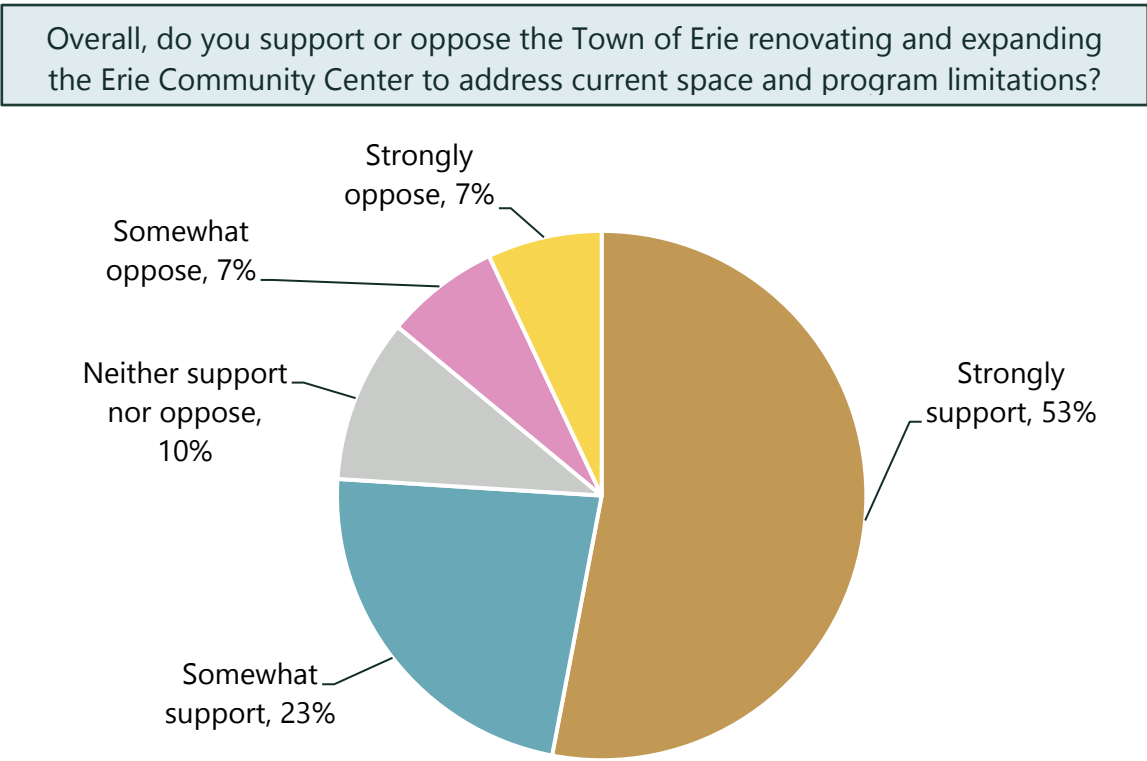


## Erie Community Center Expansion Project

The survey introduced the need to expand and renovate the Erie Community Center by citing a recent study that identified space limitations and areas operating at or beyond capacity (see the complete survey instrument in *Appendix G: Survey Materials*). Respondents were then asked whether they supported or opposed renovating and expanding the Erie Community Center to address current space and program constraints. About three-fourths of respondents indicated they strongly (53%) or somewhat (23%) supported the expansion, while 1 in 10 neither supported nor opposed it. Only a small minority reported strongly (7%) or somewhat (7%) opposing the project.

Support for renovating and expanding the Erie Community Center was higher among residents aged 54 or younger and among those living in households earning more than \$200,000 per year. In addition, residents of District 1 were more likely to support the project than those living in District 3 (see *Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics*).

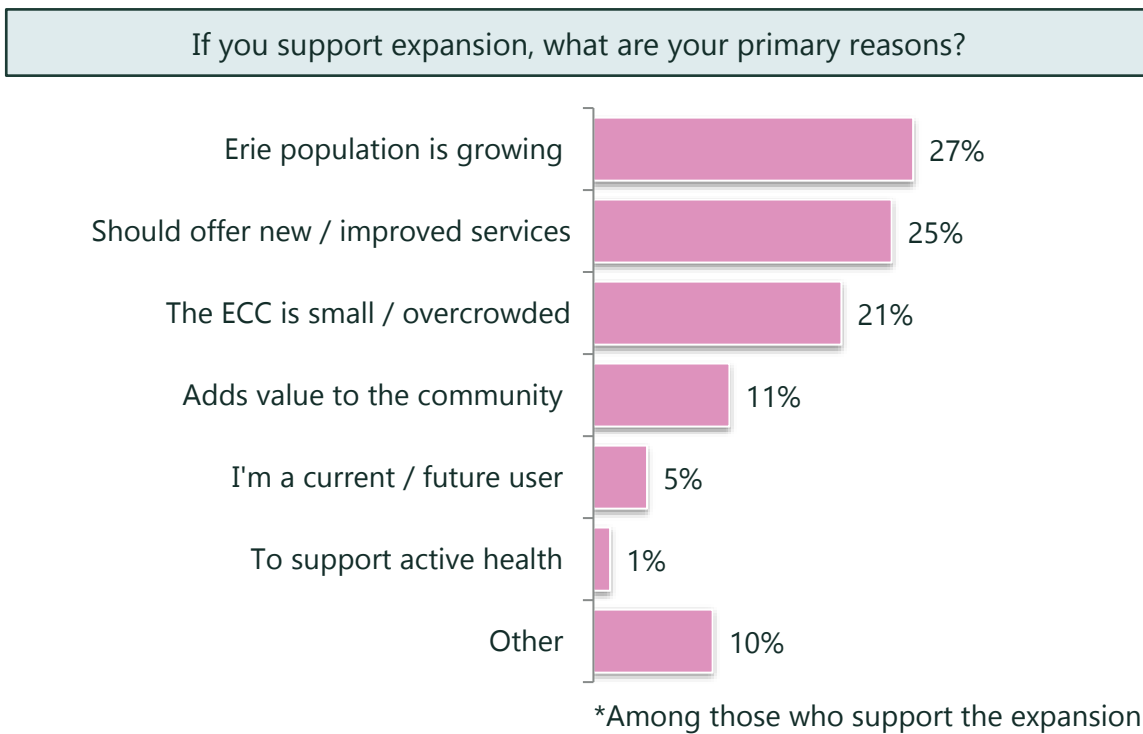
**Figure 4: Level of support for renovating the Erie Community Center, 2026**



In an open-ended question, respondents were asked the reasons for supporting or opposing the Erie Community Center expansion. Among respondents who support the Erie Community Center expansion, the most frequently cited reasons relate to population growth and the need for enhanced services. Just over one-quarter (27%) indicated that Erie’s growing population creates a need for expanded facilities, while another 25% referenced the desire for new or improved services as their primary motivation.

A smaller but still notable share (21%) reported that the current Erie Community Center is too small or overcrowded. Additional reasons included the belief that the project would add value to the community (11%) and personal use—either current or anticipated future use—of the facility (5%). All verbatim responses can be seen in *Appendix C: Verbatim Responses to Open-Ended Questions*.

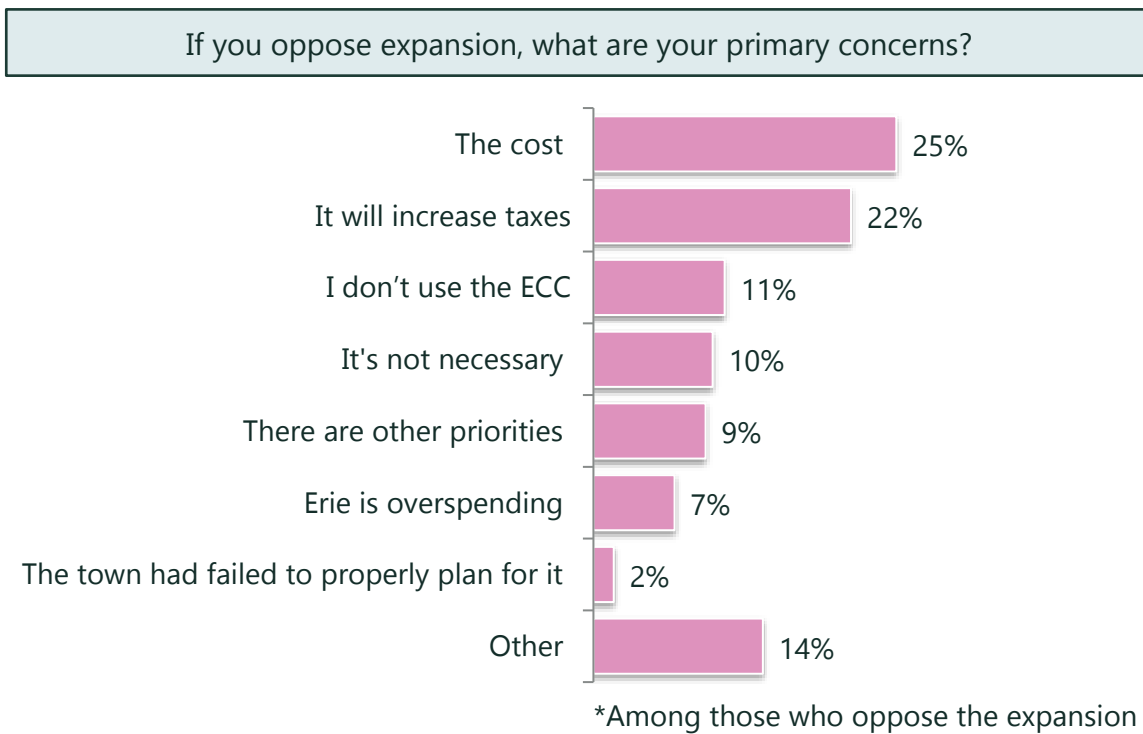
**Figure 5: Reasons for supporting the Erie Community Center Expansion, 2026 (Coded responses)**



Among respondents who oppose the Erie Community Center expansion, concerns about financial impacts were the most frequently cited reasons. A fourth of the respondents identified the overall cost of the project as their primary concern, while 22% expressed worry that the expansion would lead to higher taxes.

Other reasons for opposition were less common but still notable. About 1 in 10 respondents said they do not use the Erie Community Center, while also 1 in 10 felt the expansion is unnecessary. A similar proportion believed that the town has other, more pressing priorities, and 1 in 20 indicated that Erie is already overspending. A small share referenced concerns related to planning or management issues. Fourteen percent provided other reasons not captured in the main categories. All verbatim responses can be seen in *Appendix C: Verbatim Responses to Open-Ended Questions*.

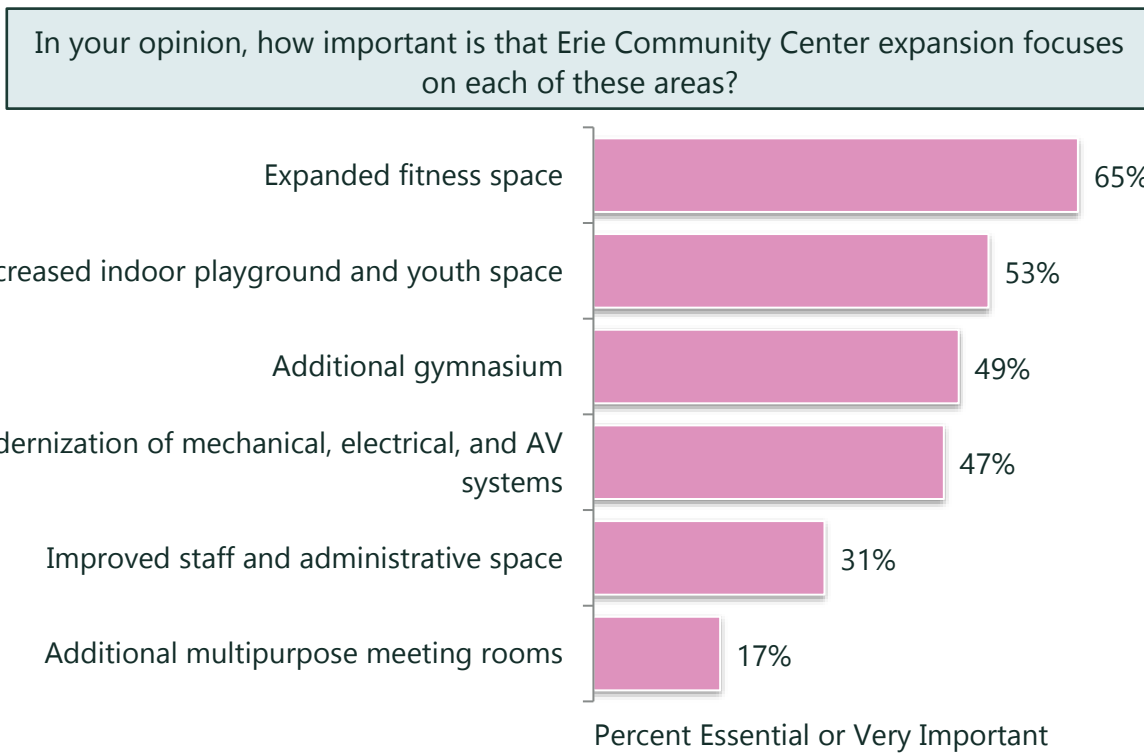
**Figure 6: Reasons for opposing the Erie Community Center Expansion, 2026 (Coded responses)**



Respondents were also asked how important it was that the Erie Community Center expansion focus on each of six different areas. About two-thirds of respondents rated expanded fitness space as essential or very important. Roughly half considered increased indoor playground and youth space, additional gymnasium space, and the modernization of mechanical, electrical, and AV systems to be essential or very important. About a third of respondents said that improving staff and administrative space was at least very important. Finally, about 1 in 5 respondents rated the addition of new multipurpose meeting rooms as important.

Residents aged 35–54 were more likely than those in other age groups to rate the additional gymnasium space as important. Meanwhile, women and residents aged 18–34 were more likely than their counterparts to place higher importance on increasing indoor playground and youth space (see *Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics*).

## Erie Community Center Expansion Funding

The survey also explained there is currently no dedicated funding source for the Erie Community Center expansion and that the Town was evaluating potential ballot measures that could include either a sales tax increase or a property tax increase (see the complete wording below).

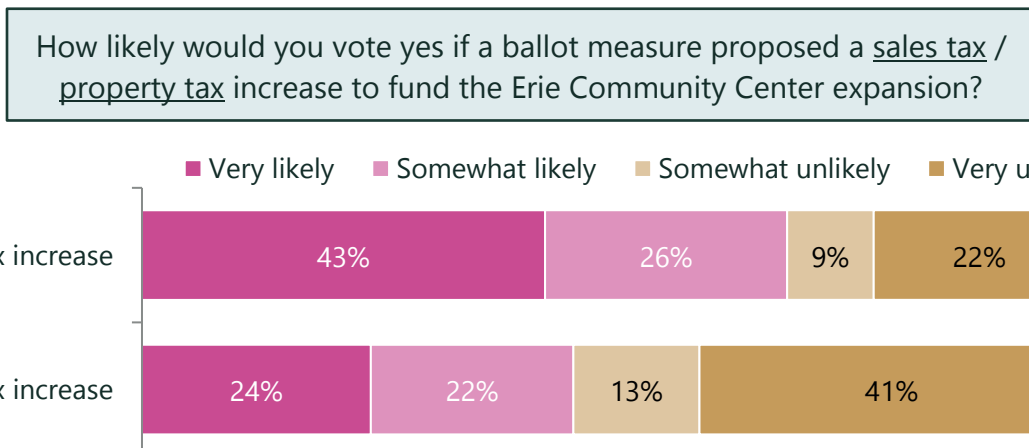
| Sales tax increase language  | Property tax increase language  |

| If funded through a <u>sales tax</u> increase, the estimated rate increase would be approximately 0.50%. For example, on a \$6 cup of coffee the sales tax would increase by approximately \$0.03. | If funded through a <u>property tax</u> increase, the estimated increase would be approximately 1.653 mills. This brings the total mill levy for the Town to approximately 14.89. For example, for a home valued at \$800,000, the annual property tax would increase by approximately \$90 per year. |

Respondents were then asked the likeliness of voting yes if a ballot measure proposed a sales tax and/or property tax increase to fund the Erie Community Center expansion. About 7 in 10 respondents said they would very or somewhat likely vote in favor of a sale tax increase of 0.50%, while about 5 in 10 respondents said they would very or somewhat likely vote in favor of a property tax increase of 1.653 mills.

Support for the two funding mechanisms also differed in the composition of their supporter bases. For the sales tax increase, a majority of supporters fell into the “very likely” category (43%), with an additional 26% saying they were “somewhat likely” to vote yes. In contrast, support for the property tax increase was more evenly split between levels of likelihood: 24% said they were “very likely” to support it, while 22% said they were “somewhat likely.” These patterns indicate that the sales tax option not only has a larger overall base of support but also a higher proportion of respondents who express strong likelihood of voting in favor.

Those living in households making at least \$200,000 per year were more likely to say they would vote yes in both ballots than those in less wealthy households. Meanwhile, renters were more likely than homeowners to support a property tax increase (see *Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics*).

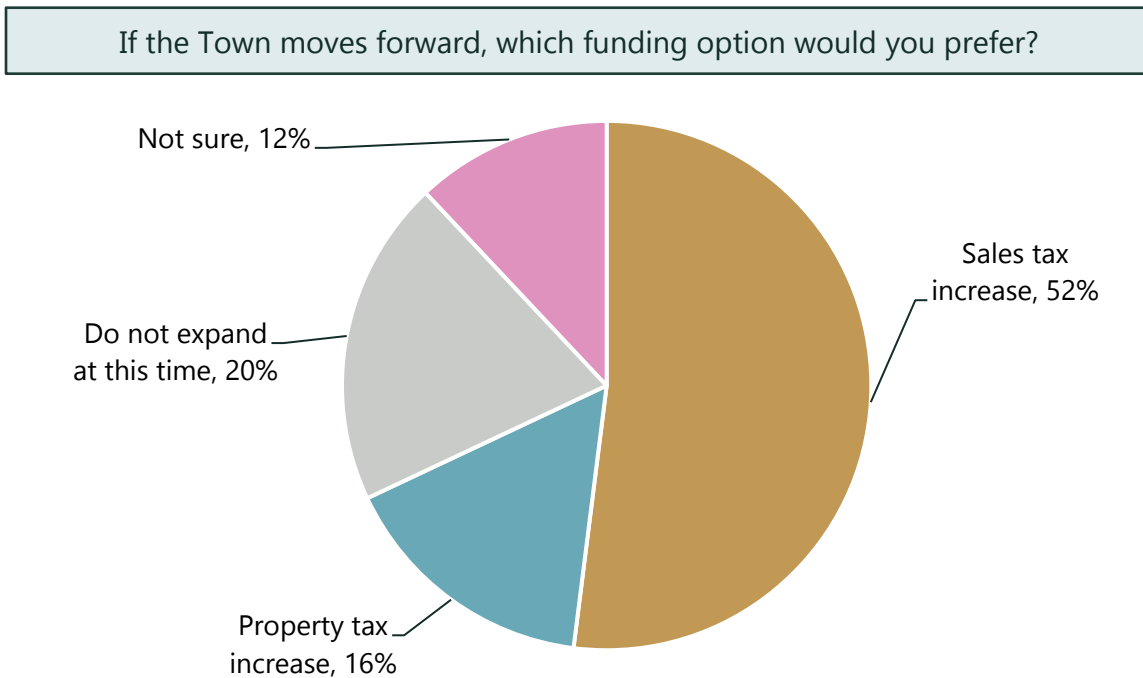
**Figure 8: Likelihood of voting Yes for a property and sale tax increase, 2026**



In a subsequent question, respondents were asked which funding option they would prefer if the Town decided to move forward with the Erie Community Center expansion. About half of respondents opted for the sales tax increases, while close to 2 in 10 opted for the property tax increase. Also 2 in 10, said this is not the time to expand the Erie Community Center, while 1 in 10 was undecided on how to proceed.

Renters and those living in attached housing units were more likely than homeowners and residents of detached housing units to support a property tax increase. Conversely, homeowners and residents of detached houses were more likely than their counterparts to prefer a sales tax increase. In addition, older residents (55+) and those living in households earning less than \$200,000 per year were more likely than others to believe that this is not the right time to expand the Erie Community Center (see *Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics*).

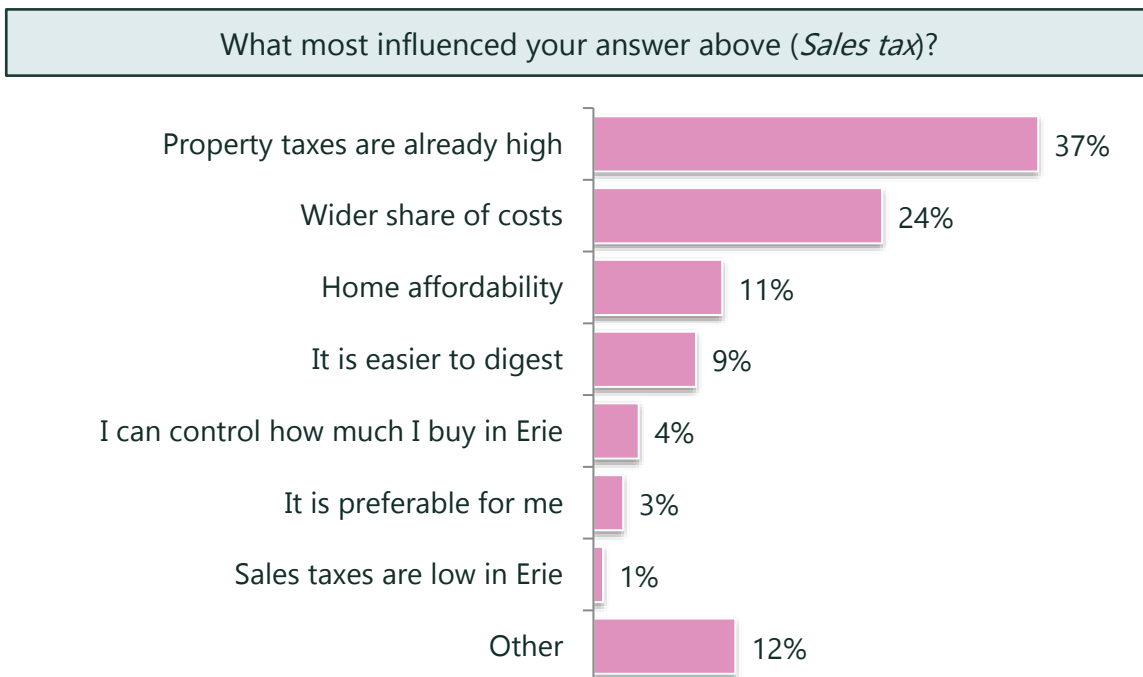
**Figure 9: Preference between a sale tax increase or a property tax increase, 2026**



In a subsequent open-ended question, respondents were asked why they preferred the sales or property tax. Among respondents who preferred a sales tax increase, the most common reason was concern about existing property tax levels. About 4 in 10 respondents indicated that property taxes are already high, making a sales tax the more acceptable option. Another 24% preferred a sales tax because it distributes costs across a wider share of residents, visitors, and consumers.

Other motivations were cited less frequently. Eleven percent referenced home affordability as a key factor, and 9% said a sales tax is easier to absorb or “digest” than a property tax increase. Smaller shares noted that they can control how much they spend in Erie (4%) or that a sales tax is simply more favorable for them personally (3%). All verbatim responses can be seen in *Appendix C: Verbatim Responses to Open-Ended Questions*.

**Figure 10: Reasons for preferring the Sales Tax Increase, 2026 (Coded responses)**

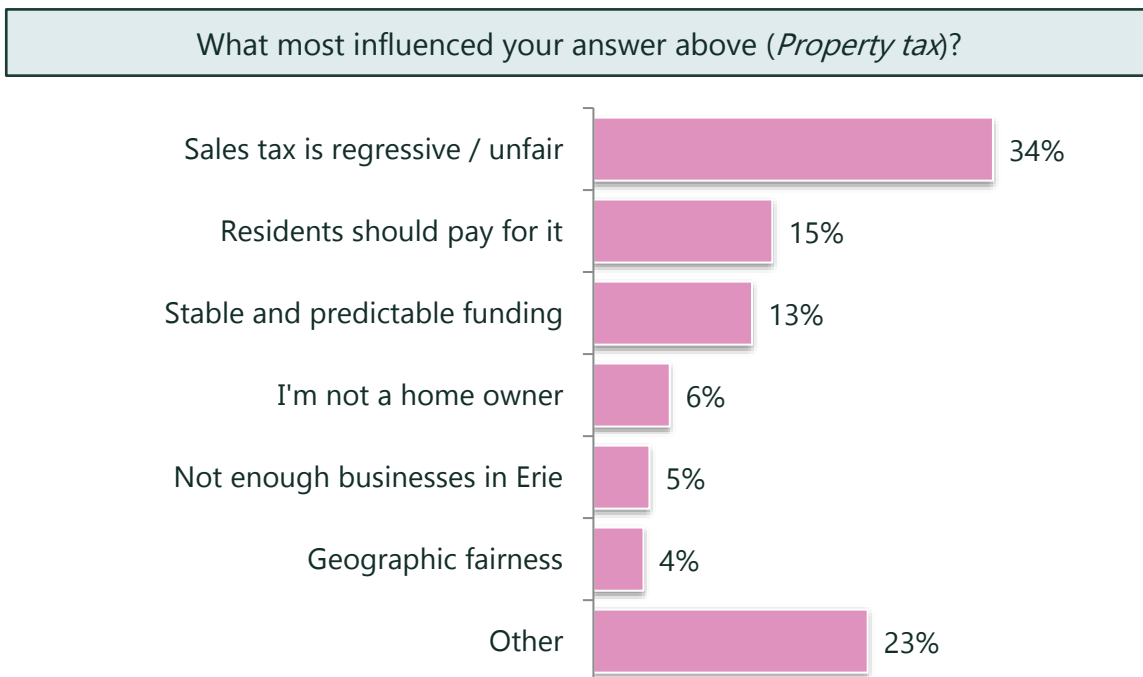

Among respondents who preferred a property tax increase, the most common reason was concern about the fairness of a sales tax. About a third of the respondents preferring the property tax described sales taxes as regressive or unfair, making a property-based approach more acceptable to them. Another 15% felt that residents—rather than visitors or non-residents—should be responsible for funding the project.

About 1 in 10 cited the stability and predictability of property tax revenue as their primary motivation. Smaller shares referenced personal circumstances or local economic conditions, including not being a homeowner and the perception that Erie does not have enough businesses to support a sales-tax-based approach. All verbatims responses can be seen in *Appendix C: Verbatim Responses to Open-Ended Questions*.

**Figure 11: Reasons for preferring the Property Tax Increase, 2026 (Coded responses)**

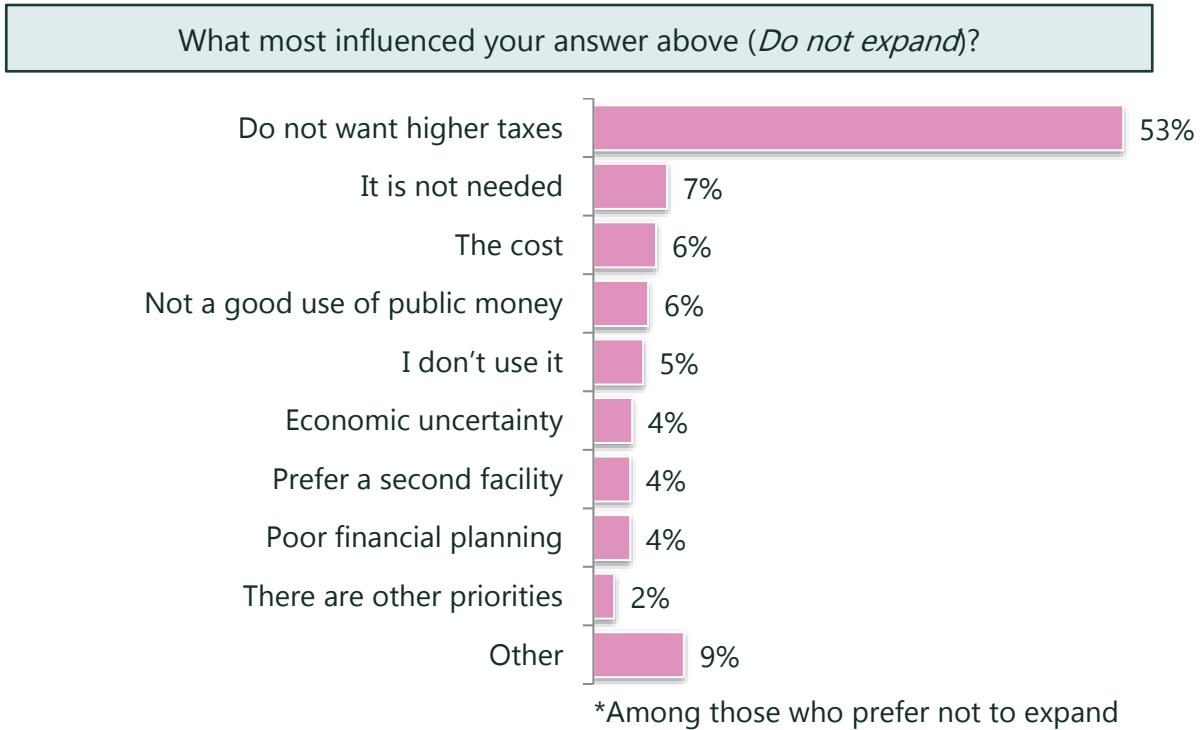

Among respondents who preferred not to expand the Erie Community Center, concerns about tax impacts were the dominant factor. A majority (53%) reported that they do not want higher taxes, making this by far the most common reason for opposing the project.

Other reasons were cited at much lower levels. Seven percent felt the expansion is not needed, and 6% pointed either to the overall cost or to the belief that the project is not a good use of public funds. Five percent said they do not use the Erie Community Center. All verbatim responses can be seen in Appendix C: Verbatim Responses to Open-Ended Questions.

**Figure 12: Reasons for preferring to Not Expand the ECC, 2026 (Coded responses)**



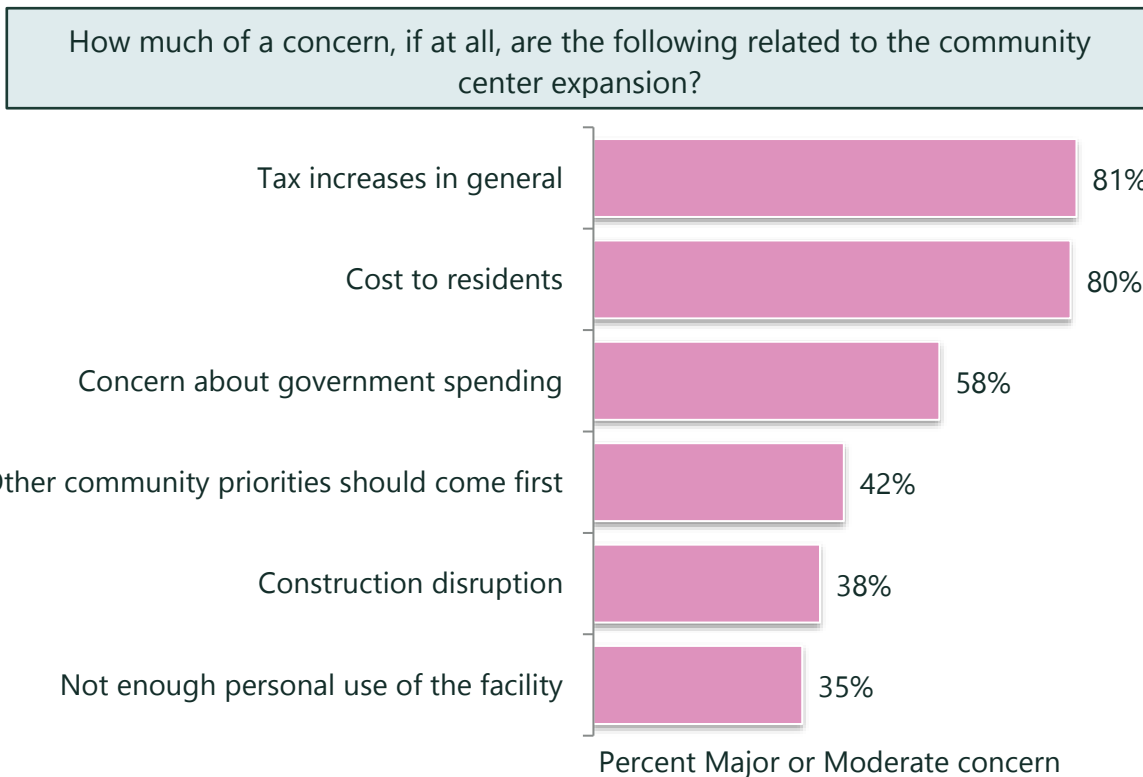
## Erie Community Center Expansion Concerns

Regardless of support for the Erie Community Center expansion, residents were asked about their concerns with the project. Concerns about tax impacts and cost to residents were the most prominent: 4 in 5 respondents reported major or moderate concern about each of both. Relatedly, 6 in 10 respondents expressed concerns about the level of government spending the project would involve.

Other community priorities taking precedence was also a notable issue, with 4 in 10 residents indicating major or moderate concern. Construction-related impacts and personal relevance were less prominent but still meaningful. About 4 in 10 respondents reported concern about construction disruption, while about 1 in 3 said they were concerned that they would not personally use the facility enough to justify the expansion.

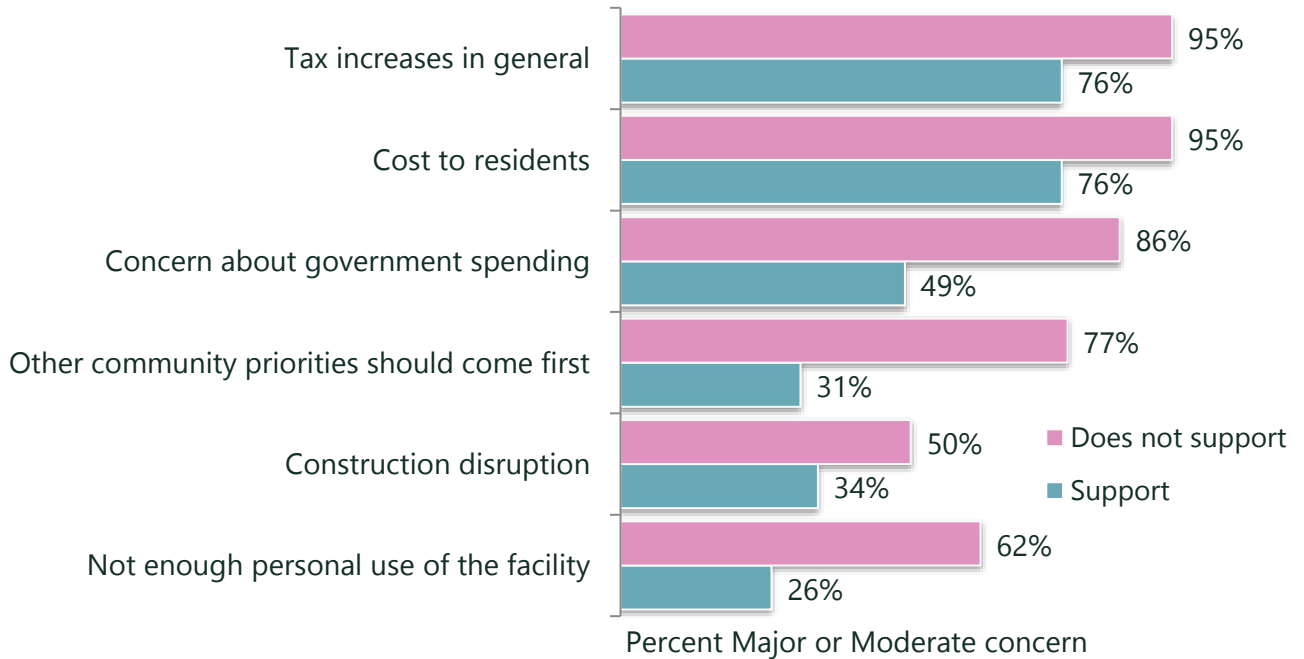
Older residents, homeowners and those residing in detached housing units or households making less than \$200,000 a year tended to be more concerned about tax increases and government spending than younger residents, renters and those living in attached housing units or households making more than \$200,000 a year (see *Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics*).

Residents who did not support the Erie Community Center expansion expressed higher levels of concern than supporters across all six issues measured in the survey. The largest gaps were in the belief that other community priorities should come first (+46%), concerns about government spending (+37%), and perceptions that they would not use the facility enough personally (+36%). ## Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics

The subgroup comparison tables contain the cross tabulations of selected survey questions by respondent characteristics. Chi-square or ANOVA tests of significance were applied to these breakdowns of survey questions. A “p-value” of 0.05 or less indicates that there is less than a 5% probability that differences observed between groups are due to chance; or in other words, a greater than 95% probability that the differences observed in the selected categories of the sample represent “real” differences among those populations.

For each pair of subgroups that has a statistically significant difference, an upper-case letter denoting significance is shown in the category with the larger column proportion. The letter denotes the category with the smaller column proportion from which it is statistically different. Differences were marked as statistically significant if the probability that the differences were due to chance alone were less than 5%. Categories were not used in comparisons when a column proportion was equal to zero or one.

Items that have no upper-case letter denotation in their column and that are also not referred to in any other column were not statistically different.

For example, in Table 34 on the following page, 87% of respondents aged 55+ (C) rated the Erie Community Center (ECC) as excellent or good. This share was statistically higher than the ratings given by residents aged 18–34 (A) and 35–54 (B), as indicated by the letters ‘A B’ below the 87%. In addition, the percentage of residents aged 35–54 who gave positive ratings (75%) was statistically higher than the percentage among younger residents, as denoted by the letter ‘A’. Taken together, these differences illustrate a clear pattern in which ratings of the Erie Community Center increase as resident age increases.

# Appendix E: Open Participation Survey Results

## About the Open Participation Survey

After data collection for the address-based survey was underway, a web-based survey was made available to Erie residents through a link publicized by the Town. Residents were able to complete the survey from March 20 to April 6, 2026. A total of 803 responses were received. This section contains results of this open participation, web-based survey. It is presented along the responses to the probability survey for context. The data from the open participation survey was not collected through a random sample, and it is unknown who in the community was aware of the survey; therefore, a level of confidence in the representativeness of the sample cannot be estimated. However, to reduce bias where possible, these data were weighted to match the U.S. Census and American Community Survey (ACS) population norms for Erie. The results of the weighting scheme for the open participation survey are presented in the following table.

Following are verbatim responses to the open-ended question on the survey. Because these responses were written by survey participants, they are presented here in verbatim form, including any typographical, grammar or other mistakes. The responses are presented in alphabetical order.

### Question 4a: If you support expansion, what are your primary reasons?

- 1. Fitness classes are too crowded, sometimes there is a wait list. 2. more variety needed within silver sneakers program eg yoga, stability. 3. Outdoor swimming pool would be a great asset
- A better pool and bigger, better fitness is needed for the growing town. It's too small for fitness and the pool is below average. Outdoor pool is very needed. I've been told it's because of mines they can't have one but then why do most the neighborhoods have ones?
- A central part of Erie community
- A growing community needs a strong meeting and recreatspace
- A sense of community
- A the city grows amenities need to grow with it to continue to provide support. I like the focus on youth sports and expanded playgrounds.
- Access to the programs and high quality spaces is one of the most important reasons we cite a high quality of life here in Erie. As a Pickleball player who sees more and more engagement by families and younger people, I'm hopeful that future expansions include dedicated indoor and more outdoor pickleball courts. I would also support paying for a second community center that includes an outdoor pool since our HOA doesn't have one.

I don't have small children, but I'd like to have more opportunities for more organized pickleball with drop in opportunities, lessons, etc. So far I have gone outside of Erie to do those things in Boulder, Louisville and now in Arvada!!! I would love to have an outdoor pool area with a designated ADULT ONLY pool. I live in the Bolder County area and there isn't a neighborhood pool in my community. In the summer, the pool is way over capacity with kid programs. I found it very frustrating to try to swim during lap/adult time when kids were playing basketball in the water around me and the lifeguard did nothing. I now go to a gym with a pool 25 minutes away. I literally can see the ECC from my window. Personally, this has been frustrating.
- I have young children and as they grow we will use it more. The town is building homes faster than grass grows. Common sense tells me if we're over capacity now..
- I like what you've done so far.
- I mainly use the gym areas with the weight machines, treadmill area, and stair machines. These areas are all heavily used, and on a busy day it can be infuriating trying to complete a workout due to a lack of machine availability.

- I recognize how crowded it is when I am there!

If the sales tax is similar to nearby towns, I think it is better than raising the rent on lower income folks. They buy essentials like food which isn't taxed. People with higher income are the people who spend on the things that are taxed and though they grumble about it, a sales tax doesn't actually affect their budget.

It seems as though there is already plans in place for very specific spaces, yet there is no mention of aquatics improvement which for me is my primary use of the facility. There simply not enough space for all who use it especially at "high traffic times" due to swim lessons, etc. Not enough lap lanes, or adult swim times for individuals who work during the day and would like to use the river or other pool space without being run over by the kids or hit in the head by a ball. Nor is there really enough space for the all of the kids when it gets busy.

- Would love the pool to be expanded. It can get very crowded and not enough lap lanes. Would use more if not so crowded
- Would rather fund a second rec center.
- You should focus on a new rec center location; expansion does not take into account future growth needs. Spend money on the long game; not the short term need.

## Appendix F: Survey Methodology

### About the Survey

The Town of Erie conducted the 2026 Community Center Expansion Survey to gather input from residents regarding the future of the Erie Community Center. The purpose of this research was to understand community needs, priorities, and aspirations in order to inform long-term planning and visioning efforts. The study was funded by the Town of Erie. ### Developing the Questionnaire

The Town of Erie – Community Center Expansion Survey instrument was developed in an iterative process between Erie staff and Polco staff. As a result, a four-page questionnaire was created.

### Selecting Survey Recipients

“Sampling” refers to the method by which survey recipients are chosen. The “sample” refers to all those who were given a chance to participate in the survey. A list of all households within the zip codes serving Erie was purchased from a vendor based on updated listings from the United States Postal Service, updated every three months, providing the best representation of all households in a specific geographic location. Polco used the USPS data to select the survey recipients.

A larger list than needed was pulled so that a process referred to as “geocoding” could be used to eliminate addresses from the list that were outside Erie’s boundaries. Geocoding is a computerized process in which addresses are compared to electronically mapped boundaries and coded as inside or outside desired boundaries; in this case, within Erie. Each address identified as being within City boundaries was further identified as being within one of the three districts. All addresses determined to be outside the study boundaries were eliminated from the list of potential households. A random selection was made of the remaining addresses to create a mailing list of 4,500 addresses.

To choose the 4,500 survey recipients, a systematic sampling method was applied to the list of households previously screened for geographic location. Systematic sampling is a procedure whereby a complete list of all possible households is culled, selecting every Nth one, giving each eligible household a known probability of selection, until the appropriate number of households is selected. Multi-family housing units were selected at a higher rate as residents of this type of housing typically respond at lower rates to surveys than do those in single-family housing units. In general, because of the random sampling techniques used, the displayed sampling density will closely mirror the overall housing unit density (which may be different from the population density). While the theory of probability assumes no bias in selection, there may be some minor variations in practice.

An individual within each household was randomly selected to complete the survey using the birthday method. The birthday method selects a person within the household by asking the “person whose birthday has most recently passed” to complete the questionnaire. The underlying assumption in this method is that day of birth has no relationship to the way people respond to surveys. This instruction was contained in the cover letter accompanying the questionnaire.

In addition to the scientific, random sample, a link to an online “opt-in” survey was publicized through various channels. This opt-in survey was identical to the scientific survey and open to all City residents.

## Survey Administration and Response Rate

A total of 4,500 households were selected to participate in the survey. Each household was contacted twice. The first contact was an invitation postcard mailed on March 3, 2026, informing residents that they had been selected for the Town of Erie – Community Center Expansion Survey. The postcard included a survey URL and QR code for completing the questionnaire online. Approximately one week later, selected households received a second mailing that included a paper questionnaire and a cover letter encouraging participation. The cover letter again provided the survey URL and QR codes for those who preferred to respond online. The packet also included a postage-paid return envelope for returning the completed questionnaire to Polco. The online version of the survey was available in both English and Spanish. Data collection remained open for four weeks, and the survey officially closed on March 31, 2026.

About 2% of the 4,500 surveys mailed were returned because the housing unit was vacant, or the postal service was unable to deliver the survey as addressed. Of the 4,398 households presumed to have received a survey, 846 completed the survey (609 of which were completed online and 237 on paper), providing a response rate of 19%. Additionally, responses were tracked by geographic area; response rates by area ranged from 17% to 20%. The response rates were calculated using AAPOR’s response rate #2<sup>1</sup> for mailed surveys of unnamed persons.

### *Margin of Error*

The 95% confidence interval (or “margin of error”) quantifies the “sampling error” or precision of the estimates made from the survey results. A 95% confidence interval can be calculated for any sample size and indicates that in 95 of 100 surveys conducted like this one, for a particular item, a result would be found that is within three percentage points of the result that would be found if everyone in the population of interest was surveyed. The practical difficulties of conducting any resident survey may introduce other sources of error in addition to sampling error. Despite best efforts to boost

participation and ensure potential inclusion of all households, some selected households will decline participation in the survey (referred to as non-response error) and some eligible households may be unintentionally excluded from the listed sources for the sample (referred to as coverage error).

While the margin of error for the survey is generally no greater than plus or minus three percentage points around any given percent reported for the entire sample, results for subgroups will have wider confidence intervals. Where estimates are given for subgroups, they are less precise.

## Survey Processing (Data Entry)

Upon receipt, completed surveys were assigned a unique identification number. Additionally, each survey was reviewed and "cleaned" as necessary. For example, a question may have asked a respondent to pick three items out of a list of five, but the respondent checked four; in this case, Polco would use protocols to randomly choose three of the four selected items for inclusion in the dataset.

All surveys then were entered twice into an electronic dataset; any discrepancies were resolved in comparison to the original survey form. Range checks as well as other forms of quality control were also performed.

Polco uses its own online public engagement tool to collect online survey data. The Polco platform includes many features of online survey tools, but also includes elements tailored to the civic environment. For example, surveys on Polco are presented with the City name, logo (or other image) and a description, so residents understand who is asking for input and why.

A series of quality control checks were also performed in order to ensure the integrity of the web data. Steps may include and not be limited to reviewing the data for clusters of repeat IP addresses and time stamps (indicating duplicate responses) and removing empty submissions (questionnaires submitted with no questions answered).

## Weighting the Data

The demographic characteristics of the household's responses were compared to those found in the 2020 Census and the 2024 American Community Survey estimates for adults in the Town of Erie. The primary objective of weighting survey data is to make the survey sample reflective of the larger population of the community.

The characteristics used for weighting were respondent gender, age, housing unit type (attached or detached), housing tenure (rent or own), race, ethnicity and district of residence. This decision was based on the disparity between the survey respondent characteristics and the population norms for these variables and the saliency of these variables in differences of opinion among subgroups.

A special software program using mathematical algorithms is used to calculate the appropriate weights. Several different weighting "schemes" are tested to ensure the best fit for the data.

## Analyzing and Reporting the Data

The electronic dataset was analyzed by Polco staff using the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS). For the most part, frequency distributions and mean ratings from households respondents are presented in the body of the report. A complete set of frequencies for each survey question is presented in *Appendix B: Complete Survey Frequencies*. Also included are results by respondent characteristics (*Appendix D: Survey Responses by Respondent Characteristics*). Chi-square or ANOVA tests of significance were applied to these breakdowns of selected survey questions. A "p-value" of 0.05 or less indicates that there is less than a 5% probability that differences observed between groups are due to chance; or in other words, a greater than 95% probability that the differences observed in the selected categories of the sample represent "real" differences among those populations. Where differences between subgroups are statistically significant, they have been denoted with capital letters.
